WELL Potluck Meeting: Help Set Goals and Formulate Action Plan For 2010

Our November gathering will follow up on the brainstorming session that occurred in October at the Harvest Festival where participants presented dozens of ideas as possible projects for the coming year.

The brainstorming ideas fell into five general categories: Local Business (local currency, "Made in Mendocino" store, re-purpose the waste stream, tourist destination, apprenticeships for youth); Transportation (bypass opportunities, walking/biking paths, rail); Health (reducing stress, increasing fitness); Natural Resources (water); Food (garden starts, grains, kitchen, cooking, food for schools, mentoring/apprenticeships for youth).

We want to build on these ideas and entertain others.

The November program will begin with a potluck at 4p.m. It will be followed by a review of current ideas and time for more brainstorming. We will then break out into smaller groups where ideas will be flushed out further.

Our hope is that this meeting will zero in on those ideas that are most viable to undertake this year, identify participants who can lead or participate in a given area, and set some goals and timelines for our tasks.

Brookside Farm needs funding to hire essential staff so that we may continue providing healthy, locally-grown vegetables to our schools and community.





WELL Member Gives Hawaii Presentation on Localization

On Wed, October 28th, I gave a presentation on Localization to a special consortium of local sustainability and permaculture groups on the Big Island of Hawaii. I gave a similar presentation three years ago in the area and am pleased to see how interest in the localization of food and energy, and emergency preparedness has increased since then.

As the local alternative news covered the event, the lively discussion continued out into the parking lot. Several participants were very pleased to have made contact for the first time. With so many people living simply and sustainably already, more networking is required. There is much wild food available, any number of organic farmers, many skill sets and knowledge of best practices available to share.

The Hilo County Government is currently funding a project to do an inventory of food sources and also is asking for citizen input on the future of island agriculture. So it is a good time to put localization of the food supply on the table.

On the subject of energy, every new housing development is now required to have a solar hot water installation. Residential water collection is becoming more common, thus saving energy to move district water supplies around. Transport is rural which creates a challenge but a FREE bus system was recently instated by the county which connects many rural roads to the towns.

As a further note, there are about 200k residents now, and before the advent of imported food, the island supported a population of 300k, a potentially positive transition.

WELL Coordinating Committee Briefs

Co-Com Meeting of 10/14/09 - Summary

1. **Brookside Farm**, like many localizing projects in Willits, is not directly part of WELL but was spear-headed by WELL founder Jason Bradford and received support from WELL seed grants. With Jason's move to Oregon, Antonia Partridge has become farm manager, and she needs help (both money and people) to maintain the farm. (See article elsewhere in this newsletter.) The CC voted to authorize use of WELL's mailing list for a fund (and volunteer) appeal for the farm, and suggested other ideas for promoting it.

2. **Election of Officers and CC Terms**: Richard and "D" volunteered to serve six month terms (to avoid a lopsided number of CC members up for election bi-annually), and we elected the following officers:

Jane McCabe – President Richard Hincker – Treasurer Madge Strong – Secretary

- 3. **Finances**: About \$1,500 has come in so far from the renewal/fund appeal mailing; hopefully more still coming. We will have a year-to-date financial report and draft budget for 2010 at our next CC meeting.
- 4. **WELL Future Programs**: We'll have a 4pm potluck general meeting on Nov. 15 to follow-up on the Oct. 4 brainstorm. The goal will be to prioritize and identify implementation steps (and volunteers) for many of the brainstorm ideas.

In addition to what comes out of the brainstorm process, we could consider some of these program ideas for 2010:

(Jan.) Speakers re: local currencies

(March.) Film Festival

(April.) Starting Gardens (panel, workshops, work parties)

(May/June) Water (& maybe Transportation)

(July) Farm Tour (Sept-Oct) Harvest Festival (Nov.) Brainstorm for 2011

(??) Speaker from Transition Towns

Next CC meeting set for Wednesday. Nov. 11, 9:30 at the office. Janice will facilitate.

Complete minutes of meetings will be posted to the website.

October 3rd Membership Meeting Election Results: There were 29-31 adults at the Oct. 3 WELL meeting, of whom 23 were voting members.

The six candidates for Coordinating Committee were all elected: Kimbal Dodge, Janice Gendreau, Richard Hincker, Holly Madrigal, "D" Maurer, and Madge Strong. (7th CC member Jane McCabe's term continues until spring.)

Two Bylaw changes were approved: allowing non-voting memberships for people from out of the 95490 area, and allowing the CC to set membership dues. The 3rd proposed change, to allow the option for members to vote by mail, received 17 of 23 votes, which is short of the 80% required to pass.

CONGRATULATIONS ON MEASURE A DEFEAT

Measure A, the ballot initiative to rezone the Masonic site and build a megamall, was trounced at the polls with a final vote count of over 62% opposed to slightly more than 37% supporting. Our "thanks" go out to all who volunteered their time and gave money to defeat this measure that WELL had opposed.

Creek Clean Up Brings in Big Catch

The Willits/Outlet Creek Watershed Group, in collaboration with the Mendocino Land Trust, the City of Willits and Tom Woodhouse, held a creek cleanup event in Willits on Sept. 19 as part of the Coastal Cleanup Day organized by the California Coastal Commission.

The cleanup took place along three stretches of creeks passing through town. The first stretch was along Willits Creek between Mill Creek Rd. and the High School. Noel Woodhouse led his soccer team along this stretch with some other volunteers rounded up by his father, Tom. The second stretch was along Broaddus Creek from the bridge where Hwy. 101 crosses the creek in the middle of the old downtown all the way to where Broaddus crosses Hwy. 20. The third stretch was along Baechtel Creek starting behind Burger King (to the East) and working back toward the Skunk Train line behind Safeway.

Approximately 45 volunteers participated in the event, gathering at JD Redhouse in the morning and finishing well before noon. We loaded debris into pickups, trailers and a dump truck provided by the city. Willits Solid Waste Company graciously waived the fees for the loads that weighed in at a total of about **4500 pounds**, accounting for almost half of the total tonnage for Cleanup Day in all of Mendocino County. This amazing amount was due largely to the heavy items pulled out of the creek beds, including tires, shopping carts, a water heater, bicycles, the top of an old coin-operated washing machine, wet cushions, bed-springs and various other metal objects.

We Need Every Body To

Attend Willits City Council Meeting

Thursday, November 12 at 6:00 PM

Why? On June 10, 2009, the Willits City Council approved Plan E for improvements on West Commercial Street. The plan was developed with wide-spread community input including that from the Willits Healthy Action Team (WHAT), the West Commercial Design and Implementation Committee, the down-town business community, and students from Willits High who want to make it safe to walk to and from school.

After hearing from people who packed the City Council Chambers, the Council voted 5-0 to approve plan E and directed staff to develop a specific implementation plan.

Now some Council members are reconsidering their support for this important project. The Council responds when a lot of us stand up for what is right.

I believe this plan needs to be implemented. More expensive plans were proposed, but this one is the least expensive option that meets the requirements for a "complete streets" solution that takes into account the needs of walkers, bicyclists, those in wheel-chairs, as well as drivers.

If you still believe in a walkable Willits, show your support, November 12, 2009 at 6:00 at the City Council Chambers.
