# PAINT THE TOWN UPDATE - by Paul Jacobson

At the end of last month we learned that WELL's Paint the Town Project did not receive the grant we applied for in December. Although that was disappointing, we will continue painting the town! (Kudos to our coordinating committee members who put in a lot of effort on this. We might try for another grant.) Meanwhile, your donations to WELL's Paint the Town fund are greatly appreciated!

We'll be initiating a process with the City and Caltrans to permit us to paint utility boxes, bridges, and perhaps a cross walk. Now that the weather has warmed up, many people have contacted us about finishing their fire hydrants or beginning new ones. Three more trash bins designs have been approved by City Manager Stephanie Garrabrant-Sierra and will soon be underway. Keep a look out.

Rebecca will be completing her K rail mural in May. We have also purchased more paint and clear coat to add some finishing touches to what has already been accomplished. And the last two K-rails need murals to complete that project.

Additionally, all the fire hydrants in Willits are now open to be painted. Previously we've been focused on Main St and vicinity. We have a new process for those wanting to paint hydrants on the west side of town, where the water pressure varies. You need to email the hydrant number to Paul for pressure identification. (The number is on a metal tag attached to the hydrant.) The hydrant must be individually tested for the correct color coding. Then you can proceed.

Also in May and extending into Summer, we will hold some painting parties to allow for groups to participate in the painting process together. We have begun formulating plans for a Fall Bike Ride event with NCO's Walk and Bike Mendocino Project, which may involve some sort of scavenger hunt with prizes to find and view the newly painted hydrants. WELL is also collaborating with Willits Center for the Arts on their plans for public sculptures and larger murals. And the City's Revit-ED committee is proposing better signage at highways and in town. So stay tuned!

We still have a lot of donated paint to use, so if you need some please email Paul <u>4paulj@gmail.com</u> or Lisa <u>ellemontez7@gmail.com</u> to make arrangements. We still need small plastic containers with lids for easier paint distribution; these can be dropped off at the Willits Hub, 630 S. 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

# County Initiates Climate Advisory Council Slide Presentation at City Council May 22, 6:30 pm

Finally, the climate crisis is getting attention – at least globally and locally. (Of course the current US Administration is still adamantly in denial - all the more reason to act locally.)

Thanks to scores of volunteers working for months, the Board of Supervisors voted unanimously on March 19 to establish a new Climate Advisory Council, with some follow-up decisions on how that Council will be appointed and do its work. Citizen activists intend to stay fully involved in drawing up far-reaching, visionary and pragmatic plans to reduce global greenhouse gas emissions (GGH) AND to prepare for some of the likely impacts of the climate catastrophe in our county. Citizens' meetings are held at the Mendocino Environmental Center in Ukiah. Meanwhile, the Willits City Council is scheduled to hear a presentation on this issue by Doug Nunn on May 22, 6:30 at City Hall. The show is an update of Al Gore's "An Inconvenient Trust." Doug Nunn was trained as a presenter by Al Gore himself.

City staff has already begun some preliminary steps to review the City's energy usage and develop an Energy & Sustainability Plan. Perhaps this presentation will raise this to a higher priority.

#### WHAT'S NEW IN CITY OF WILLITS

Fire Chief Wilkes gave City senior staff an in-depth, hands-on training on how to deal with a natural disaster – much more lively and useful than FEMA's usual on-line training. Thanks to our chief & Fire Dept.!

Scholarship Opportunity: The California City Management Foundation is offering two \$1,500 scholarships for graduate students interested in pursuing a career in local government. Eligible applicants should go to the <u>Wes McClure Scholarship page</u> on the CCMF website by May 10.

On April 25, Governor Gavin Newsom signed legislation requiring out-of-state and online retailers like eBay, Etsy or Amazon to collect sales taxes like local brick and mortar California businesses, eliminating the out-of-state and online unfair advantage. Good news for our locals!

Grant News: If all goes well we should be getting over \$20,000 from Cal OES from last summer's power outage that caused damage to the City's computer systems.

The City and the Chamber are continuing to finalize the plans for the Great Race, with lots of help from the community and businesses. Come enjoy it on June 25.

In mid-April we celebrated National Dispatcher week, including special recognition for Debbie Tonelli's 35-years on the job. Out Dispatch Center handles over 13,000 calls annually, saving lives and helping those in need. City Police have also been busy with a variety of issues from deaths and drugs to traffic and illegal camping.

Public Works has been busy, including working with PG&E inspecting and fixing problems with power poles.

The incessant rains held up work by Granite (Caltrans' contractor) on Main Street curb painting as well as on Sherwood Road realignment. Completion is now project in November.

The Revit-ED Committee met in April and identified a number of signage improvements (i.e. way finding signs, gateway monuments, kiosks, hwy signage, billboard, directional signs) that would attract and guide the traveling public to key destinations in the City and help local businesses. They also developed ideas to improve City recreational facilities and parks. Some funding may be recommended in the upcoming City budget and/or grant requests.

Applications are now being accepted for potential medical cannabis dispensaries in designated zones the City, with a

deadline of May 21st. If more than three apply, there is process to select the top three, as specified in the ordinance.. Information is on our website at http://www.cityofwillits.org/240/Medical-Cannabis-Activity-Program.

The Engineering Department has been busy with several projects, including North Maple Street Improvements, projected to start mid-June; Blosser Lane Drainage, also scheduled to begin in June; and Pavement Preservation Project (slurry sealing) on 7 streets beginning in late May. Staff is working to complete plans for utility replacement and paving of Maple, Pine, and Spruce Streets, likely to be constructed between July and October. The City has also contracted for flood mapping in case of a dam breach.

Now that the rain is mostly over, the Davis Creek Water Main relocation is back in progress. We will notify customers when their service will be affected. Similarly, flushing of water lines proceeds. Please check the flushing hotline at 459-7104 for updates as to where the operators will be flushing next. Both City reservoirs are at full capacity!

The Watershed Salvage Logging and Reforestation project has now planted approximately 80,000 new trees since that portion of the project was completed last November.

#### PG&E PLANS EMERGENCY OUTAGES – by Madge Strong

Because of the recent horrific wildfires, in part blamed on downed PG&E high-voltage power lines during high wind and drought conditions, PG&E is undertaking a major effort to address wildfire safety. PG&E representative Brian Bottari summarized their program at Willits City Council on April 24. He also promised there would be another public forum in Willits.

Willits is surrounded by Zone 2 and 3 high fire hazard areas. Most of the Valley floor is not in the zone, but its power lines come through the high hazard zones (which is why we lost power in the 2017 Redwood Complex fire).

Cutting off power ('de-energizing' the lines) is a last resort but necessary in high wind hazardous situations, said Bottari. Meanwhile PG&E is also taking preventive short- and long-term steps such as inspection and clearing of lines, upgrading to steel poles where needed, and other system improvements. "It's basically 5 years of inspections that we are getting through in the next few months," said Bottari.

The two most important take-aways for local residents:

1. Go to pge.com to register your contact info so they can alert you in case of emergencies; and Be prepared for power outages of 48 hours or more when hazardous conditions arise. This could happen with very little notice. PG&E's website has info on how to be prepared.

#### FREEDOM FROM PTSD WORKSHOP

Panel of 4 professional psychologists including a child-family specialist, (Jed Diamond, Paul Jacobson, others not yet confirmed); EFT "tapping" demo; Cannabis healing for PTSD - Maureen Smythe RN; Yoga short form demo; Psychosomatic release demo; Horses, pets and animals - our healing friends; Farmers - the healing power of working in soil, the garden supporting new growth; Project Sanctuary - local women's shelter handles PTSD cases all the time.

New this year will be stands for two of our local seed companies —Quail Seeds and Sundial Seed Company— who will be selling non-hybrid and open-pollinated seeds adapted to our local climate and easy to grow in organic gardens. Both companies have seeds for food, medicine, habitat and seed-saving.

# WELL'S ENERGY FORUM - Report

Excerpts from Forrest Glyer's Willits Weekly article plus notes by Madge Strong

Sustainability was the focus on March 28 at the Willits Environmental Hub as a group of activists, business owners, local elected officials, and representatives from Sonoma Clean Power gathered together for an Energy Forum hosted by Willits Economic Localization (WELL).

Local renewable energy pioneers Michael Hackleman, John Takes and Keith Rutledge all spoke at the event, as did 3<sup>rd</sup> District Supervisor John Haschak and Willits City Councilmember Madge Strong, who is also chair of the board of WELL and an alternate rep on the SCP board.

Representatives of Sonoma Clean Power led off the forum. SCP now provides energy generation for much of Sonoma and Mendocino counties, although PG&E still distributes that energy. Under SCP's basic service, 45% of its energy is from renewable sources, such as wind & solar, and 87% is from carbon-free sources. (42% is from hydroelectric – carbon-free but not considered 'renewable.') Customers can also choose to get their power from 100% local, renewable sources by signing up for the Evergreen Service, which costs about 11% more. [These customers enable SCP to invest in more local solar projects.]

SCP's mission is "to create local solutions to the climate crisis...through bold ideas and our practical programs. It's incredibly important and cannot wait. A great thing about being a local agency to Sonoma and Mendocino counties is we can react and respond to needs here locally," said SCP's spokewoman.

Some programs include grants for 2017 fire victims; free EV charging stations in homes; and DIY energy efficiency toolkits available for check-out at local libraries, including Willits.

Each of the speakers added valuable perspectives:

Keith Rutledge urged investing in energy conservation, noting "you're already paying for it in your monthly bills." Vince Capri of Apperson Energy stressed "clothing your house," i.e. insulation and stopping energy leaks. Michael Hackleman has focused on off-grid systems, noting those homes can do all the same things with about 1/5<sup>th</sup> the energy – just paying attention.

John Takes returned to Willits with his North Bay Solar Electric company, and they'd love to help folks go solar here. Michael Foley brought in the idea of micro-grids that can provide their own power in the event of the big grid going down.

John Haschak has been very helpful in the Board of Supervisors' approval of a Climate Action Plan now being initiated. Madge Strong is hoping to get City of Willits to prioritize energy conservation, especially with big users like the wastewater treatment plant.

# ERRP: Willits Goes Wild Field Trips 2019 – by Pat Higgins

The Eel River Recovery Project's (ERRP) field trip to the upper Eel River in March was a big success and much fun was had by all. Willits folks got into Robin Leler's Willits Goes Wild van, then joined another 10 people in Potter Valley.

The most exciting stop was the upper Eel River roaring over Cape Horn Dam - like standing near Niagara Falls. The group also stopped to see the salmon habitat improvement project near the Trout Creek Campground and Tule elk grazing on the shores of Lake Pillsbury and another 60 near Salmon Creek.

The next upper Eel River field trip is planned for June 15 and may include bicycling. Swimming will be the main emphasis of the August 17 trip. Call Robin at 459-0155 if you want to get on board.

EERP (formerly sharing space at the Hub, now with an office in Laytonville) is exploring the feasibility of developing an Upper Eel River Salmon Parkway that would increase opportunities for hiking & biking, swimming & boating, and salmon habitat resto-

#### Mar. 11, 2019

We approved co-sponsoring the Health Summit being organized by Claudia Wenning on Apr. 6 at the Grange.

We recently tabled at several Farmers Markets, gaining a few new or renewed members. Most renewals have come from an email and US post letter reminder, but there are still quite a few non-renewed. We need to continue an active presence on Facebook, as well as reminders.

We reviewed and approved several requests for our co-sponsorship, enabling these events that are aligned with our mission to benefit from our insurance and/or tax-deductible non-profit status:
